

Since the publication of the September Historic Times I wanted to provide an update on the Butterfly Garden in the Arboretum. I am glad that people are taking notice. The butterfly garden in the Arboretum was installed in the spring of 2017 with a collection of native plants. Now finishing the second year of growth and development there have been successes and failures as in any garden. A lack of milkweed is not one of the problems. There are 13 different varieties of milkweed native to Ohio. Two of them are currently growing in the butterfly garden in abundance, swamp milkweed and butterfly milkweed. The most ubiquitous type, common milkweed is growing in a garden plot nearby. Gardens take time to develop and mature and usually three years is the standard benchmark. Next year should be great. There have been butterflies and other pollinators in the gardens all season. Sorry that the walker didn't experience them.

Monarch butterflies need milkweed as the exclusive food for their caterpillars. Adult Monarch butterflies need nectar plants for food. All of which are contained and maintained in the small plot of the butterfly garden. Nectar plants are vital in support of the monarchs as they migrate to and from Mexico in their annual journey to Ohio and the Old West End.

The garden has been registered as a Monarch Waystation, a designation that is provided by Monarch Watch, a national organization supporting research and plantings to support the protection of the threatened Monarch Butterfly.

Once considered a weed, milkweed in it's many varieties is now recognized as an important plant for monarch survival.

Neighbors have and hopefully will continue to add these to their gardens as a way to save these beautiful insects. Native Milkweed seeds will be available through the arboretum in the months ahead. Plan a spot for them in your garden now.

#### OLD WEST END see a slight drop in **SECURITY**

When the weather starts to cool down, we tend to crime, however it is

still important to stay vigilant. Here are some tips for you and your property to be safe.

Lock your doors: Lock your car doors and you house doors. In up to a quarter of thefts, owners left their property unlocked. Even if you are just running back in to the house to grab something quickly, remember to lock your car doors

Light up the night: as leaves begin to fall from the trees, hiding places are reduced, but it is always a good idea to keep your porch lights on, or invest in a motion-detection light.

Look into apps and low-cost cameras: There are all sorts of apps and low-cost cameras you invest in to monitor your property or door. Some apps include Ring, Skybell, August Doorbell. Check it out.

Halloween is around the corner, be sure to make costumed vistors are safe from tripping hazards. Tip: Use Christmas lights to light up your front porch. Use a tuna can as the base of the pumpkin candle to reduce fire hazards.

#### **TREES & SIDEWALKS**

There has been much talk and concern about the trees that have been taken down recently, and rightfully so. If the city has marked a tree in the tree lawn (a public right of way) for removal don't just take their word for it. Call the Forestry Dept. and find out why. Three trees were taken down from in front of 2301 Robinwood that did not need to be taken down for sidewalk replacement. There is a City "sidewalk replacement" program going on the OWE. There are many uneven sidewalks as we all know in the neighborhood and a need for ADA approaches at the curb. But we as neighbors need to be diligent about what is happening with both trees and sidewalks. Just because a tree is marked does not mean it needs to be taken down unless it is diseased. And no, the contractor cannot take the sandstone unless the homeowner does not want it. Here are numbers to call and to continue to call if your calls are not answered.


